


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Paris Trip continued

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
Kira the Machine

#KiraTheMachine

Firrhill pupil Kira was diagnosed with an aggressive neuroblastoma in 2014, when she was 11 years old. She had received 19 rounds of chemotherapy and three major abdominal surgeries. The life-saving surgery she desperately required was not available in the UK, but in order for her to receive this treatment in the USA, her family needed to raise £340K. Firrhill pupils ran an amazing fundraising campaign on her behalf, also involving many neighbouring Edinburgh schools in the fundraising, including Currie, Craiglockhart and Bonaly Primary, and the Royal

and Balerno High Schools. Fundraisers included "hats for Kira", cake sales, bag packing and bucket collections. The generosity of pupils who gave both time and money on Kira's behalf was inspirational. Mr Hamilton, Head Teacher is extremely proud of Firrhill's pupils, who contributed an amazing £15,000 towards Kira's cancer surgery which she received in May at the Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Centre in New York.









We wish Kira a speedy recovery and hope she will be back at school in the autumn term.
